
ESSENTIAL WORK -- DISPOSABLE WORKERS:

Black and Latinx workers hit the hardest





AFRICAN AMERICANS ARE OVERREPRESENTED IN HIGH-RISK ESSENTIAL INDUSTRIES



ESSENTIAL WORK -- DISPOSABLE WORKERS:

San Francisco COVID Study of 10,047 "excess" deaths

Overall 22% increase in mortality rate for working age adults:

- 6% increase for White working age Californians
 28% increase for Black Californians
 36% increase for Latino Californians
- 39% increase for food and agriculture workers overall
 59% for Latino food and agriculture workers
- 36% for Black retail workers
- 28% for transportation; 27% facilities; 23% manufacturing

ESSENTIAL WORK -- DISPOSABLE WORKERS

Massachusetts COVID Study of 555 COVID deaths:

- Latino workers in food prep and server deaths 8x rate of white workers
- Black health care workers deaths **3x** rate of white health care workers
- Latino and Black workers in all occupations had age adjusted mortality rates
 more than 4x white workers

Fig 1. National OSHA complaints and COVID—19 deaths per million (7 Day Average), January 16-September 18, 2020





Fig 2. Heatmaps showing the lagged correlations between OSHA complaint volume and COVID-19 cases and COVID-19 deaths, nationally and by US region, January 16, 2020—September 30, 2020

A Worker-Centered National Agenda for Safety and Health

- 1. Strengthen and enforce our safety laws and regulations
- 2. Don't let employers silence us
- 3. Listen to workers -- we need a seat at the table.
- 4. Ensure safe workplaces for all: Equity and Inclusion
- 5. Guarantee fair and just compensation for workers, no special deals for corporations
- 6. Create worker-centered protocols to track, prevent and protect against COVID-19
- 7. Confront the workplace effects of climate change
- 8. Prevent chemical catastrophes and harmful exposures.

A Worker-Centered National Agenda for Safety and Health

1. Strengthen and enforce our safety laws and regulations.

Enact Emergency Temporary COVID-19 Standards.

Infection prevention/control plans in every workplace developed with workers.

Backed by strong enforcement.

Training in language spoken

2. Don't let employers silence us.

Overhaul OSHA whistleblower program (11c).

Protect immigrant workers.

3. Listen to workers -- we need a seat at the table.

Meaningful collaborations: Listen/respond to workers' priorities/concerns.

Funding for worker organizations to develop worker leaders and peer educators.



4. Ensure safe workplaces for all: Equity and inclusion.

Stop misclassification, protect temporary workers.

Legislation: End exclusion of domestic, agricultural, public sector, and gig workers and stop sexual harassment.

5. Guarantee fair and just compensations, no deals for corporations.

Paid sick and family leave is essential for all workers.

Federal oversight of workers compensation programs.

Strong focus on/inclusion of immigrants and workers of color.
